Percussion includes an array of instruments: snare drum, bass drum, timpani, cymbals, xylophone, bells, marimba, triangle, tambourine, drumline instruments and so much more! This is why we are careful to choose students that are willing to work hard, maintain good grades and good behavior because there is a high level of responsibility involved with playing percussion! Students must be willing to play all of these instruments in order to be accepted into the percussion section.

Students will spend the majority of their time in class on the bell kit and drum practice pad. If students are unwilling to play bells then percussion is not the right instrument for them!

Many of these instruments are supplied by the school. **The student is only required to supply drum sticks**, a practice pad and a bell kit. You can buy these supplies at several local music stores or online.
